SELF ASSESSMENT REPORT

Smt. Devilaben Mehta Department of Mass Media Studies was started in the year 2008. Department offers BMM degree with two specializations i.e. Journalism or Animation in the final year. Through this course we try to improve language proficiency, enhance confidence level and improve presentation skills to meet with the challenges in the media industry. Our regular visiting faculties comprise of experts from media industry such as Zee 24 TAAS, TV9, ABP Maaza who teach practical subjects such as Basics of Reporting and Web Journalism, Broadcast Reporting etc. They also train students in handling latest instruments like 3 CCD cameras and FCP. Their expertise and experience mould young minds and help get new perspectives of media industry. They train our students by giving theoretical and practical knowledge of media industry. Experts from prominent print and electronic media such as ABP Maaza, Times of India, Loksatta are invited as guest speakers in the department.

Students from FYBMM have been presenting plays since the year of inception as a part of project for the subject 'Theatre and Stage Craft' which include some masterpieces such as 'Naagmandala' by Girish Karnad and 'Aadhe Adhure' by Mohan Rakesh. Students take up complete responsibility of the play and handle all the departments such as acting, directing, stage props, costumes, prompting, make up, accounts etc. Students improve their understanding of co-relation between media and society through various practical methods such organizing exhibition, conducting survey, interviewing, anchoring, reporting etc. Students had conducted an event on product launch and organised exhibition on "A tribute to Mumbaikars' after a series of bomb blasts in Mumbai in July 2011.

A sound proof multi media laboratory for audio and video shooting, editing, broadcasting, reporting and photography with the modern technical devices such as five MAC machines of Apple and software Final Cut Pro (FCP) which is used by BMM students. Professional cameras i. e. Canon DSLR 1200 D and Sony HXR are used for recording and photography. Students make documentaries, and films, design visiting cards, advertisements as well as they shoot and record various academic events and cultural programmes in college.

Students are taken to field visits to various print and electronic media houses for first hand experiences. Students have done internship in print media organizations such as Thane Vaibhav, Pudhari, Mumbai Samachar, Sagar, Shahar Mumbai, UNI etc. and electronic media such as Mi Marathi, Zee 24 Taas, ABP Maza, TV9, AAj Tak, rediff mail etc. Our students are placed with well known media organizations handling significant responsibilities by holding posts such as sub-editor, reporter etc.

Media related competitions are organized to shape students' thinking and to give them platform by showcasing their talent. Competitions such as making documentaries, reporting, photography, extempore etc. for which students have made documentaries on the issues such as 'Save Girl Child', 'Old Age Home', 'Child labour', 'Women Empowerment', 'Incredible India' etc. Students have also made documentaries for our trust.
